ПРЕДИСЛОВИЕ

Пособие «English for University Students. Grammar Exercises» представляет собой сборник упражнений по темам, изучаемым в курсе грамматики на первом году обучения. В каждом разделе имеются как традиционные упражнения, так и коммуникативные задания, нацеленные на ситуативное употребление грамматических структур.

Расположение материала не предполагает жесткой последовательности при применении его на практике, что дает преподавателю возможность самому определять порядок изучения тем и время, необходимое для освоения того или иного раздела. Пособие может быть использовано как для аудиторной, так и для самостоятельной работы. Оно содержит упражнения по основным разделам грамматики: артикль, имя существительное, имя прилагательное, наречие, местоимение, глагол (видо-временные формы, страдательный залог, косвенная речь и согласование времен, модальные глаголы, глагол в условных предложениях) и некоторые другие. В задачу авторов входило создать сборник упражнений, направленный на практическое освоение английской грамматики, однако в некоторые разделы вошли и задания аналитического характера, необходимые для лучшего осмысления студентами тех или иных грамматических явлений. Во многих случаях основой для подобных упражнений служили отрывки из произведений современной англоязычной литературы.
